FOAMY FUN OF OCTOBERFEST IS UPON US AGAIN

Writer Dave Barry once said, "Without question the greatest invention in the history of mankind is beer. Oh, I grant you the wheel was also a fine invention, but the wheel does not go nearly as well with pizza."

Other notables have chimed in.

Benjamin Franklin famously said, "Beer is proof that God loves us and wants us to be happy."

Even Homer Simpson has given us wisdom on the pint, saying, "Ah, beer! The cause of and the solution to all of life's problems."

Beer-making goes back thousands of years. In Mesopotamia (ancient Iraq), early evidence of beer is a 3900-year-old Sumerian poem honoring Ninkasi, the patron goddess of brewing, which contains the oldest surviving beer recipe, describing the production of beer from barley via bread.

Love a hoppy IPA these days? Here are some interesting, arcane facts from recent centuries about how that popular "modern" brew evolved.

By royal decree until the 16th century, ale was brewed in England without hops, a bitter and aromatic twining vine of the mulberry family, once known as the "wicked weed." Before that time, various bitter and flavoring substitutes were used, including balsam, dandelion, hay, pine needles, mint, tansy, wormwood, coriander, and even ivy.

An old proverb makes reference to "the coming of the hop" from Holland in the early 1520s, about the time Henry VIII challenged the Pope's authority, and turkeys were introduced from the New World: "Turkey, heresy, and hops in beer, came into England in the same year."

By the 19th century, English laws declared malicious damage to hops a felony. 🍀

We want to avoid last minute chaos, so make plans to attend as soon as possible. Starting at this month's meeting you can reserve your spot for \$30/person. 🍀



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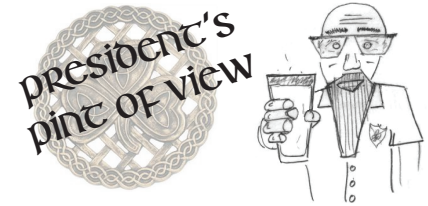
