OUR COMING FSOSP ST. PATRICK'S RACE IS AT RISK

The Annual St. Pat's 5K/10K Run is always an event to look forward to each year. Son **John Leonhart** sponsors the outing, held on the streets of West Des Moines, and works hard with his cohorts to make it better each time out.

In addition, the FSOSP uses the date to award a college scholarship to one male and one female senior high school running athlete. We reach out to area athletic directors for nominees and usually the awarded students participate in the run with us.

But currently, we have a hiccup in the 2019 competition plans.

Officer Jeff Hartshorn of the West Des Moines police department sent Leonhart a September note:

"Giving you an early heads up regarding runs on public roadways. The police department is in the process of attempting to eliminate runs on public roadways. With the overall growth of the city and the lack of resources, we will not be approving special event applications involving those types of runs in the future. The PD can be over-ridden by city council, but we will be recommending these types of runs (be moved) to our trail system or Raccoon River Park type areas."

Leonhart recently contacted Hartshorn to see if there were any developments or changes to this proposed change and received bad news.

Hartshorn again said "the PD intends to deny those applications which impact the quantity of streets affected by runs on public roadways." He was sorry, he said, but "we have to look at the overall safety of participants and the motoring public."

Leonhart and his support crew are nonplussed.

"We need to know if anyone has an idea for what we can do regarding relocating our running event," he said.

Treasurer **Josh Soliday** says we have not paid for any 2019 permit, so there is no contractual issue to pursue, but we want to be welcome wherever we go, anyway.

On the positive side, there is still a lot of time to regroup and find a solution, though. However, the yearly increase in participation means we need a big scheme.

Ideas anyone?

PROPHETIC WEATHER FORECASTING FOR FOLKLORE FANS

So far, our usual Iowa winter has not arrived. The frosty, snowy “hunch weather” we are so accustomed to is mysteriously giving us a break as we creep through week after week of usually the coldest season of the year.

Here’s some folklore connected to our uncharacteristic weather luck that might be interesting.

Dating back to the 18th Century, Scottish Highlanders form a sort of almanack of the coming year’s weather based on observation of twelve days, beginning at the last of December. Old people still pay attention to this prophesying.

They hold as an infallible rule that whatever weather happens on each of those days means the same will prove to agree in the correspondent months.

This means January is to answer to the weather of December 31, February to that of January 1, and so on with the rest of the months.

The direction of the wind on New Year’s Eve was also used as an indicator of what to expect in the following year. *“If New Year’s Eve night wind blow south, it betokeneth warmth and growth.”*

So how are we doing?

December 31 gave us light snow and rain, a “wintry mix” with a high of 36 and a low of 8 degrees. That foretold a chilly January and it looks like the temps are heading that way this weekend. Will the month remaining get messy, too?

New Year’s Day gave us a high/low of 19/7 with winds and overcast skies. This was 10-15 degrees below average and means that February might not be looking so good for us.

January 2 was about normal with a high of 31, sunny but windy. Could that mean a crisp, chilly St. Patrick’s Day parade is on tap? That would be about normal, but the sun is a positive note.

The high/low temps on Jan. 3 (46/26), Jan. 4 (50/29) and Jan. 5 (54/31) were all about 15-20 degrees below average and each day was sunny, giving us hope for a delightful spring run in April, May & June.

This past Sunday’s breezy, rainy, drizzly forecast of 44 degrees was still well above average. But will July be prove to be wetter and windier than normal? If so, someone better tell the Ragbrai riders.

The good news is that Monday’s mild, sunny, above-average 51/32 foretells a great Iowa State Fair run in August. 🍀

Starting with a click on the center item in the first row, you can follow the prompts to help spread info on your Facebook and other social media outlets. Get crackin’!

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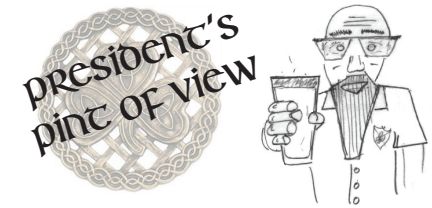
